

## FIFE

The sites on this page already appear in the Gazetteer, but the trees have not been recorded since the date shown in the descriptions below.

| Forgan, near Tayport      | Site of a ruined church near the mouth of the river Tay. The 5 trees recorded grew beside the ruins. According to Hutchison, popular tradition gave these trees an age of 600 years. The largest girthed was 12' 5" with a bole length of 18'. Two of the 5 are described as being of a different variety, having lighter foliage and a more upright appearance, while the others have branches dipping to the ground and in some places springing up from it again. |
| Leslie House              | Leslie House is owned by the church (2006). The tree was described in 1867 as "situated near Leslie House." In 1867 the yew was described as "height, 40 feet, girth at 7 feet from the ground, 6 feet 2 inches."  |
| Otterstone, near Aberdour | The precise location of these yews is not known. Here were/are "six fine yew trees standing in a row, with trunks measuring from 6 feet to 9 feet in girth. These have evidently at one time formed part of an old hedge, but are now fine specimen trees."  |
