Chaceley	In 1924 there was “a yew tree on the N side of the (church) building.”
Ebrington	“The churchyard has many ancient yews.”
Elmstone	Churchyard yews
Fairford	From Churchwardens Accounts: A yew with a Known Planting Date of 1718
Forest of Daylesford	No information about where in the forest these are – or what size they might be.
Hatherop Castle	In 1906 Elwes and Henry recorded “a remarkably fine yew walk at Hatherop Castle, Gloucestershire, the seat of G. Bazley, Esq., which is supposed to be about 300 years old, in which the trees average about 60 feet in height with a girth of 9 to 12 feet.” It would be good to compare 100 years later. This site is now a private school so permission would need to be sought before visiting.
Littleton on Severn	2 spreading churchyard yews described in 1940
Prestbury	From Churchwardens Accounts: (1) Yews with a Known Planting Date of 1842 (2) A yew with a known planting date of 1742
