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| Dinedor | öspreading yewsö described in 1938. öí hidden in orchards and spreading yews at the foot of the hill.ö |
| Donnington | öí fine yews in its trim churchyard.ö |
| Dorstone | 1892: öExtending our ramble through Dorstone village, we climb the hill (towards Arthurø Stone) before us by the side of an ancient and overgrown trackway, running steeply up between the fields, and overshadowed by sombre old yew trees.ö |
| Dymock Wood | Grid ref 677 285 Forestry Commission land near Ross. Queenø Wood, to the west, has ãmaturing oaks with yews under.ø |
| Holme Lacy | A report of a large yew in the grounds of Holme Lacy college. |
| Mansel Ley | öí a shapely old yewí ö probably in the churchyard. |
| Rushock Hill, nr. Kington | Three yews, known locally as the 3 Shepherd grow on the embankment of the ditch on Rushock Hill. There are now only two, though a replacement has been planted. |
| Wapley Hill Fort | (SO 345 624) An Iron Age hill fort near Presteigne. In 1895: öThe Warren is a capital landmark of the neighbourhood, being bare of trees with the exception of a solitary Yew tree growing on the top of the rampart at a distance of about 40 yards west of the southern entrance.ö The hill side and fort are now clothed in trees, but the yew might still be in situ. |
| Willersley | öí it has a yew standing like a lonely sentinel in the grassy churchyard.ö |
