

## HERTFORDSHIRE

Albury	Churchyard: Yews with known planting dates in the 1850s.
Ashwell	Churchyard: Yew with known planting date of 1718, planted to mark the place where "John Larken would later be buried."
Berkhamsted	St Peters churchyard – yew recorded in 1946
Brent Pelham	Yews reported by a cave near to this village.
Hexton	Dark yews surround the church.
Hunstonbury Cophthall	5m girthed yew in grounds of private house. I have not been able to find this location, though there is a Hursdonbury, near Ware.
Hyde Hall	A circle of yews somewhere along the drive.
Much Hadham	St Andrews churchyard: Yew of 4/5m girth.
Offley	St Mary Magdalene: Undated church records note "a huge yew overhanging the path."
Rickmansworth	An engraving of 1715 is reported to show a yew in this churchyard.
Shenley Hill	120-150 yews – house and gardens now owned by business, so not sure of access.
Shephall	A churchyard yew of 15/16ft girth. A seat has been cut into the yew at some time.
St Albans	17ft girthed yew at St Michael's church – Roman Forum site. Other descriptions are: "When you get to the Abbey turn right and walk round it with the building to your left. Follow the path round the Chapter House and continue walking past a large old Yew Tree." Another states: "In Sumpter Yard by the Abbey, you can see an extremely old yew."
Throcking	Spreading churchyard yew
Wall Hall Ampitheatre	Wall Hall College is near Radlett. 60/70 yews girthing 8 to 11ft. At the lip of the basin the largest with a girth of about 14ft.
Woodland sites	The following may have yews: Box Lane, near Boxmoor Hill, Hemel Hampstead, Ramacre Wood, Hanging Wood, Hay Wood, Bury Wood.
