Barmeath, Dunleer, Co Louth	A reference in Lowe (1897) of a yew with a girth of 10ft at the ground. Information supplied to Lowe by Mr Carolan.
Carrigallen (Drumsilla House) Co Leitrim	A reference in Lowe (1897) of a yew with a girth of 12ft 8ins. Information supplied to Lowe by Capt.O'Brien.
Clones (Ballynure House) Co Monaghan	A reference in Lowe (1897) of a yew with a girth of 14 ft at 3ft and a height of 40ft. Information supplied to Lowe by Mrs Haire Foster, who noted that Ballynure means 'the town of the yew'.
Donington, Athlone, Co Westmeath	A reference in Lowe (1897) of 4 yews with girths of 14ft, 13ft 6ins, 11ft and 10ft 6ins. Information supplied to Lowe by Wellington Gray.
Gartnamara, Co Galway	A reference in Lowe (1897) of a yew with a girth of 12ft 6ins at the ground, 22ft 6ins at 5ft, and a height of 40ft. At 5 feet it 'spreads into 20 great branches' (E.W.Lynam)
Hollymount (Millford), Co Mayo	A reference in Lowe (1897) of a yew with a girth of 10ft 2 ins at the ground. Information supplied to Lowe by Mrs Perrin.
Jeninstown (Rockmanshull House) Co Louth	A reference in Lowe (1897) of a yew with a girth of 10ft at 3ft. Information supplied to Lowe by W.Beck
Kill Abbey, Dublin	An old reference to "very ancient specimens at the ruins of a very ancient church". Monkstown and Clonkeen are mentioned as possible locations.
Kilmacannac, Co.Wicklow	A reference in Lowe (1897) of 12 yews with girths between 9 and 12 ft.
Moira, Co Down	A reference in Lowe (1897) of a 16ft girthed yew – reported by Colonel Richardson
Rossanagh, Ashford, Co Wicklow	A reference in Lowe (1897) of a yew with a girth of 14ft. The information was supplied by Col. Tighe – and the Dower House is the family home of the Tighe family and the most likely place to find this tree.
Rossfad, Ballinamallard, Co Fermanagh	Yew described in Lowe (1897) as 13ft in girth at the ground, 12ft 6ins at 3ft and a height of 42ft.
Youghal Abbey, Cork	An 1850 reference to an "ancient yew amongst the brushwood."
