

LINCOLNSHIRE

Alford	Described in <i>The History of Lincoln County</i> of 1834: ðan elevated situation about 2 miles westward from Alford, and contains only one house. This edifice is constructed of red brick í í on the north of the house was formerly an avenue of (seventy?) yew trees of which about a dozen only remain. The place was once the seat of a family names Haugh.ö
Ayscoughfee Hall	Near Spalding ó 18 th century yew walks ó 1720 is the likely planting date.
Castle Carlton	Near Louth. 5 yews in the formation of a cross. Possibly Rookery Farm.
Grantham	Easton Walled Gardens ó -Walk along the terraces, over the stone bridge crossing the river Witham and up the ancient yew tunnelø This is a 400 year old garden.
Irby-on-Humber	There is a reference to an ðold yew treeö in the Rectory courtyard. It was still there in 1958.
Killingholme	Site of a moated manor house north of the village ðsurrounded by some of the most ancient yew trees in the kingdom, over seven centuries old.ö
Swineshead Abbey	Reference to a yew here in 1733
