

SUSSEX	
Albourne	Note in church register of the planting of a yew tree in 1835.
Ashdown Forest	Three yews on the old drove road through the forest – found at the Duddleswell Crossroad.
Brightling	A yew of approx. 16' girth on a bank – not churchyard.
Cissbury Ring	A “Yew tree area” near the flint mines. Another report says there are 2 yews on the ring.
Climping	In Mee’s <i>King’s England</i> series: Old yew tree at the church gate.
Crawley	“A splendid churchyard yew.”
Ditchling	“The 13 th century church stands by a great yew.” Mee’s <i>King’s England</i> series
Horsted Keynes	4 ancient tracks meet at the churchyard. Yew has been described as “quite large and impressive.”
Iping	No details
Itchingfield	“Yew trees flourish around the church.”
Lindfield	Brooke House – in 1896 Lowe described 3 yews, girthing 15', 10' and 10' 4". All were measured at a height of 3'.
Lurgashall	Churchyard - A yew with a Known Planting Date of 1821.
Mayfield	In <i>Field Paths and Green Lanes – in Surrey and Sussex</i> by Louis J. Jennings 1884 is described: “An old yew-tree stands appropriately at the entrance to the village near the blacksmith’s forge.”
Mount Coburn	‘Yews’ – no more information.
Nuthurst	“Its churchyard has some fine yews.” Mee’s <i>King’s England</i> series
Patcham	Yew planted in 1801 at W end of church to ‘celebrate the arrival in London of the preliminaries of peace.’
Sedlescombe	Churchyard described as “full of yews.”
Storrington	“3 yews 500 years old” have been described. (probably churchyard)
Telham	In Mee’s <i>King’s England</i> series is the following: “A little way from the Abbey is Telham, the place to which William came from Hastings to meet Harold, and there is still growing there an ancient yew tree on the site of the Conqueror’s G.H.Q.” Can anyone establish the precise location of this G.H.Q?
Wartling	A churchyard yew, 35 yards NW of the church alongside the Lamb Inn. Girth of about 15ft noted 20 years ago.
West Grinstead	www.madeleinebeard.co.uk/Documents/shrine.html “The room in which we spoke, partially hidden by ancient yew trees, was where the congregation heard Mass before the church was built.....the trees are a constant reminder of the history of hidden Catholicism in this holy place.”
West Thorney	Churchyard yew with a known planting date of 1870.
Wiston	“Along with all this, Charles Goring's grave lies in the 12th century Wiston churchyard and overshadowed by a great yew, beneath the heights of Chanctonbury Ring.”
Woodmansgreen, Linch	In the churchyard of St Luke’s church is a yew planted in 1705 when the church was built. O/S map 197 Grid reference SU 862 275
