

## SHROPSHIRE

Alberbury	“...sombre verdure of some yew trees.” <i>Nooks and Corners of Shropshire</i> (1899) by H.Thornhill Timmins
Ash and Yew	Churchyard yew with known planting date of 1855.
Barrow	Tom Moody, buried Nov 19 <sup>th</sup> 1796 – his wish was to be buried under the yew trees there.
Boningale	Churchyard is described as ‘having a very old yew tree.’
Bridgnorth	Grand old contorted yews on the sandstone cliffs of Apley Terrace, near Bridgnorth, were described in 1874.
Chirbury	“...could yonder old yew-tree but speak.” <i>Nooks and Corners of Shropshire</i> (1899) by H.Thornhill Timmins
Church Stretton	A shapely churchyard yew. Others in nearby Rectory Wood, described as “Quite old yews by pool.”
Easthope	Many hedgerow yews in this area.
Hardwicke Grange, near Hadnall	Arboretum and Fruticetum (1838): “In Shropshire, at Hardwicke Grange, 9 years planted, it is 13ft. high.”
Longdon/Plealy	Trackway yews on the path between these places.
Loppington	In 1881 “a number of yews are to be seen in the churchyard.”
Loughton	A line of yews lead towards this church, girths thought to be up to 16 ft.
Middlehope	Footpath yews
Morville	Somewhere near Morville is a Yew Tree Dingle
Munslow	Trackway yews
Richards Castle/Ashford Carbone	Trackway yews on the path between these places.
Tugford	“Down past the church, from the westward hills, comes a lane that in any but the best of weather must be a mere mountain torrent, paved with the naked rock and overarched by ancient yews.” <i>Nooks and Corners of Shropshire</i> (1899) by H.Thornhill Timmins
Willey Park	A yew with a known planting date of 1817. Described in Arboretum and Fruticetum (1838) as “21 ft. high, the diameter of the trunk 1ft., the head 18ft.
