Arbuthnott	The yews are described by Hutchison (1890) as growing "in the manse garden" with the "church of St Ternan of Arbuthnott, near which they stand, consecrated by Bishop De Bernham in 1242." According to Hutchison, when Pinkerton saw these yews at the beginning of the 1800s he pronounced them to be at least five hundred years old. Hutchison considered it not improbable that they were planted when the church was consecrated. Girths of the male and female pair were then about 8' and 9'.
Huntley Lodge	An 1838 reference in Arboretum and Fruticetum: "In Banffhire, at Huntley Lodge, a yew is 33 ft. high, the diameter of the trunk 1 ft. 5in."
Monboddo	An 1838 reference in Arboretum and Fruticetum: "In Forfarshire, at Monboddo, 100 years old, it is 20ft. high, the diameter of the trunk 1ft. ?in., and of the head 20 ft.
Oldmeldrum	The only description we have for this location is Old Meldrum Manse. Hutchison (1890) recorded 2 yews "believed to have been planted when the manse was removed to the present site from the other side of the parish in 1680". Girths at 3' were 10' and 10' 2".
Strichen House	The remains of Strichen House lie a mile to the southwest of Strichen. It dates from 1821 and was gutted in 1954. In the 1846 Topographical Dictionary of Scotland the garden was described as "embellished with some venerable yew trees more than a hundred years old, and with thriving plantations of recent date."
