

The origins of this church and site are not known. In 2015 the church was for sale.

1998 and 2000 - Tim Hills: Three yews grow in a line south of the church.

The tree nearest to the road is female with a girth of approximately 17' at the ground in 2000. From its solid bole of about 6' are numerous branches. This was the least healthy looking of the three yews.

In 2015 Paul Wood recorded a girth of 16' 10" (5.13m) at the ground. Although the trees had been recently maintained it was difficult to get close to the bole and ivy was beginning to cover parts of it.



2000: The middle tree is male, with branches spreading in all directions, including over the adjacent field. I recorded a girth of 18' 7" at the ground.

2015: Paul Wood recorded exactly 19' (5.79m) at the ground. Twiggy growth made this the only available photo.



2000: The tree furthest from the road is male, with several large upright branches emerging from a solid looking bole at 6'. Foliage was abundant, especially on more recent growth. Branches which would have arched over the nearby fenced in grave had been sawn off. Girth - 16' 4" at the ground.

2015: Paul Wood found this the most accessible since the main branches overhanging the churchyard wall had been recently shortened. He recorded a girth of 16' 7" (5.05m) at the ground. Old white sapwood was visible in many places and there was much twiggy growth.



2015: Also noted was this young yew establishing itself on the terrace 10 m east of the church.
