



2014: The largest of three yews in the churchyard is male and grows S/SSW of the church. It has been larger girthed in the past and a measurement around the tree, including the pieces of stump, is about 18'. The living part of the tree has a sizeable gash revealing hollow spaces. It is possible that some of the stumps were internal growth and if that was the case the tree would once have been much larger than what we see today.



The yew, left, is female and grows more or less SE of the church. It is a notable specimen with a girth of 12' 2½" at 3' and 12' 3" at 1'. It is upright in appearance and divides into many branches at about 6'. It has a solid trunk with some deep fissures. Foliage was thin. Drying vegetation, a fire hazard, was being stored beneath the tree.

Further SE is a nondescript tree that appears to be an Irish Yew that is reverting to *Taxus baccata* L.
