

The 1953 *History of the County of Sussex* noted that 'on the south side of the churchyard are three yew trees, of no great size'.

July 2000: Four female yews grow in line on the south side of the church. This low, stunted tree is the largest. Its bole was covered in ivy, which also filled the tree, growing along both live and dead branches and appearing at the top of the canopy. Foliage was not surprisingly thin with many leaves yellow.

Girth:

1997: 9m tall x 165cm diameter @ 0.3m    *The Sussex Tree Book* - Owen Johnson

2000: 17' 6" is a rough guide only, measurement was hampered by wild rose, hawthorn and the steep slope by the tree. Tim Hills
