



Four yews grow here. Tree 1 (above) is an extraordinary male. It grows on a mound, SE of the church. At the ground about 2' 6" of its girth is dead wood. At a height of 25/30' it is suddenly truncated. There is no real branching below a height of about 15'. The tree's bark was particularly flaky. Girths recorded were 13' 1½" at 1', 12' 10" at 2' and 12' 8½" at 3'.

The other three grow in a line NW of the church and were presumably planted at the same time. They have become very tall.

Tree 2 (right) is a male which divides into two sides at a height of about 5'. The sides then appear to rejoin a few feet higher before separating properly. Girth was 12' 2" at 2' and 11' 9" at 1'.

Tree 3 (below left) is female and divides by 1' into two trunks, each leaning slightly outwards. Girth around both stems was 12' 3" at 6".



Tree 4 (below right) right, is a leaning male with no low branches. Some old Chicken-of-the-Woods fungus was noted by a dead section about 8' up in the tree. Girth was 10' 5" at 1'.
