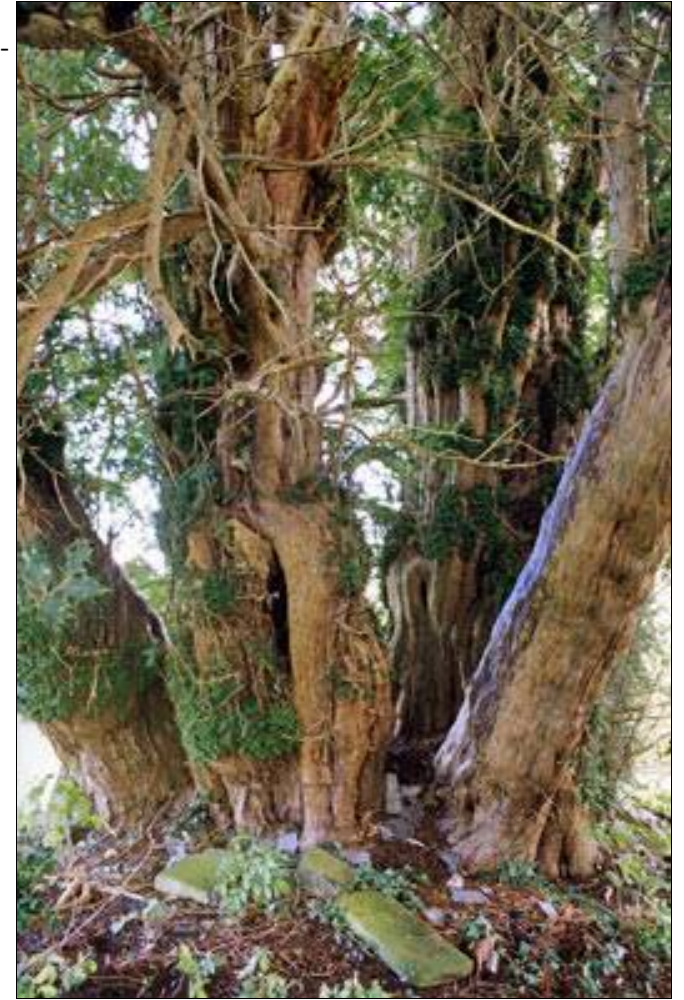


The churchyard is massive, would have once been almost circular and may have been enlarged in the early medieval period. It is thought to have once been the mother church for the area.



This fragmented female yew grows east of the church. Its main section divides into three, while a further two large separated trunks create an imposing tree. A small stump indicates a lost trunk. Hollowing was observed in all parts of the tree. Girth in 1998 was 31' 10" at the ground and 6' at 5' around the largest fragment.
