

May 2006: Two exceptional yews grow here. The most significant is SSE of the church, a 23' girthed twin-stemmed male yew (right). One of its two stems has been cut off at about 6'. Out of it once grew a cherry or birch which is now dead. This stem is joined to the more significant half of the yew for about 3/4'. In the centre grows a well developed oak tree. Yew and oak leaves mingle high into the canopy.



The second male yew (left) grows ESE of the church. With a girth of 18' at 1' it is three stemmed from a low bole. One of the three is dead, while the largest has more recent growth around what were the truncated original stems.

A large elder grows up against the yew.
