

2007: The female yew grows on the south side on a piece of land raised 6' above the path leading to the church. This is a fine example of a solid, columnar and fluted bole, from which more than a dozen thick branches reach upwards and outwards above a height of about 12'. A girth of 15' 10" was recorded at the ground



level of the highest ground, keeping the tape horizontal. At 4' above the highest ground with a horizontal tape 16' 1" was recorded.



By November 2016 the tree was competing with ivy and was no longer so eye-catching in appearance. Girth was measured at the ground all around the tree riding over a few roots and 16' 6" was recorded. It was remeasured at 4' above the highest ground with a horizontal tape and had a girth of 16' 3".

The millennium yew, north of the church, is strangely sited, so that its branches are already lost in a nearby hedge. Girth was 1' 6" close to the ground. Its branches at a height of about 1'. General height was about 6' high with a central leading branch rising a further 2' above that.
