

In 1946 Cornish asked vicars to send information about any old yew trees in their churchyards. He received this reply from Milson: 'A tall yew beside the path which leads to the main entrance on south side of the church'.

1999: The male yew is made up of two fragments that might be joined just below the ground. The smaller of these is a hollow shell (A), most of which has been cut off at 6' and from which only one branch now grows.

The main part of the tree (B) is a fluted trunk which divides into many branches. A prop has been secured to give the tree some support. In 1984 Morton recorded a girth of 5.9m (19' 5"). In 1999 I recorded 19' 5" close to the ground.
