

1834: Lewis's *Topographical Dictionary of Wales* described this location 'close to the turnpike road, in an extensive cemetery enclosed within a ring fence and surrounded with some venerable yews of luxuriant growth, intermixed with other trees'.

1998: While we counted 30+ younger trees in a semi circle, we saw no sign of the trees that were once supposed to complete the circle on the other side of the busy A road. Only one tree now stands out, this male yew growing on a mound east of the church. Five large living and one dead branch rise from its short bole. Girth was about 27'.
