

1998: The old male yew grows about 7 metres from the porch and even closer to a house adjoining the churchyard. Its bole is completely hidden behind a circular stone wall about 18" high, on top of which a structure of wood embedded in concrete is angled towards the tree. We were informed that after storms in the 1980s the entire concrete and stone structure moved and had to be renewed. At the same time a tree surgeon removed a lot of what was considered to be surplus height.

Emerging from this unique structure are 3 main branches, one upright and two leaning. Growth had been trimmed to a neat ball shape. Church records show that the tree was 'shored up' as early as 1743.
