

In 1908 *A History of the County of Hampshire: Volume 3* described that 'a widely spreading yew in the churchyard, stands to the south of the cross-roads'.

1999: A girth of 4.60m a 1.1m (approx. 15' 1" at 4' ) - Russell Cleaver

2012: Peter Norton recorded that the yew grows close to the southeast gate. He described a large female yew that had lost much of its outer shell, so that a large internal stem is now visible. A girth of 14' 10" at 3' was recorded.



Two younger female yews were also noted, growing at the northeast gate and having girths between 7' and 8'.
