


2001: The site is on a hillside reached through the village's new housing estate. Though the church is gone, the old female yew remains, growing among the headstones. The bole develops into a leaning main branch which retains a girth of 10'/12' high into the tree. The opening into the hollow is 1' across at the ground, closing over at about 6'. In 2001 it was filled with breeze blocks, cans and assorted rubbish. Large quantities of ivy had been cut at the base, while the stem of a small unidentified tree was being swallowed up in the yew's growth. Girth: 16' 3" at 1'. No photos taken.

2014: The photos show that the tree continues to attract churchyard rubbish, both outside and inside, and it was not possible to remeasure. Large quantities of ivy now appeared in the tree's branches.









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
