

The yews in the avenue that leads to the south door vary considerably in girth.

Trees 1 to 4 form the line on the east side, starting closest to the church.

Tree 1 is female, with a new yew growing on the edge of the original trunk which was cut off at a height of about 3' 6". It has many low branches. Girth was 8' 9" at about 1', above its bulging roots.



Tree 2 is male which from 3/4' upwards develops into many upright stems. Girth was 10' 6" at 1', above roots.

Tree 3 is female, consisting of two trunks with a large space between. Whatever grew in the centre is long gone. Branches have been allowed to dip to and reach the ground. Girth was 9' 1 1/2" at 1'.

Tree 4 is male which above 5' develops into 3 rising branches. Girth was 5' 2" at 1'.



One yew on the west side has been lost. Tree 5 is female, with numerous upright stems and a gap on the side facing the church. Girth was 11' 10" at 1' 6". Tree 6 is male with a solid bole to 5', many branches and a girth of 7' 2" at 2'. Tree 7 is male. Some dangling branches had been propped. Girth 9' 11" at 1'.



Tree 8 is a continuation of the line of yews on the west side of the churchyard, but separated from them by a footpath. The large piece of old white sapwood can only hint at what might once have been a large section of its stump remains and has sprouted copiously. Girth was 8' 4" at 1'.



Tree 9 grows SE of the church, a male tree from which many branches have been cut. Girth was 5' 9" close to the ground.
